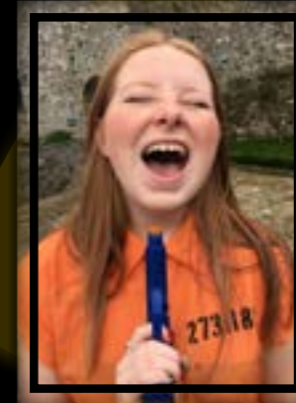


FROM HELL TO HEAVEN
